Texas State Representative Diane Patrick to Meet with Green Oaks Nursing Facility Caregivers and Residents to Discuss Long Term Care Issues Impacting Local Seniors

*Texas Ranks 49th in the Nation in Medicaid Reimbursement and Faces Proposed Federal Budget Cuts;
Green Oaks Nursing Facility Caregivers Ask Rep. Patrick, Texas State Delegates to Help Strengthen
and Protect Texas' Strained Long Term Care System*

Arlington, TX (April 8, 2008) – In a facility tour and briefing today with State Representative Diane Patrick (R-Arlington) at Green Oaks Nursing Facility, front-line caregivers explained that if the funding cuts to Medicare and Medicaid currently considered by Congress were to pass, Texas seniors' nursing home care would be severely undermined – and asked Rep. Patrick and her fellow delegates to help fight the potential funding cuts in Texas, where seniors are already particularly vulnerable due to Texas' Medicaid rates for nursing homes ranking 49th in the nation. Medicare cuts to long term care currently considered by Congress could total \$104.9 million in Texas along, making it the fourth state in the nation for the highest Medicare cuts.

According to recent data, Texas seniors receive only \$106.59 on average per patient per day, while the national daily average is \$153.83 per patient. Caregivers explained that this difference, over time, can make a major impact in patient care programs and services.

“We appreciate Rep. Patrick’s joining us today to meet our residents and staff, and to see first-hand how we can work together to improve Texas’ standing in delivering quality long term care,” said Tom Tolleason, Green Oaks Nursing Facility Administrator. “Many citizens, including many of our policymakers in Austin, do not fully realize the dire funding situation facing long term care here in Texas – particularly now taking into account additional proposed Medicare cuts – and we hope to work with our state’s political representatives to create additional care improvements and greater long-term security for our patients.”

Green Oaks Nursing Facility caregivers pointed out that a dialogue on Texas’ long term care status is needed to make the issue a broader part of the state and national health care policy debate. At the national level, the National Commission for Quality Long Term Care, headed by former U.S. Senator Bob Kerrey (D-NE) and former House Speaker Newt Gingrich (R-GA), recently found that most Americans do not understand the nature of long term care funding – with 34 percent believing that most long term care is paid for by Medicare, 20 percent thinking it is paid for by Medicaid, 22 percent believing that individuals

and their families pay for most long term care and 13 percent saying they do not know at all how long term care is financed.

“I am thankful for the opportunity to meet with local nursing home residents, their family members and caregivers and to discuss how we can work together to help improve long term care for Texas’ seniors,” said Rep. Patrick. “With Texas’ current low ranking in Medicaid, and additional funding cuts coming out of Washington, now is a particularly important time for us to collaborate on new solutions to protect senior care.”

Representative Patrick was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in November 2006, and serves as State Representative for House District 94, which covers most of Arlington in Tarrant County.
